Be Sure Your Legislators Hear from You in August

Congress must make some big decisions in the second half of this year:

- Provide service members with a 1.8% pay raise dictated by current law to match private sector pay growth, or cap pay adjustments at 1% as proposed by the Pentagon and supported by the Senate Armed Services Committee
- Pass an alternative budget reduction plan by 1 October 2013 to avoid additional sequestration cuts, or institute another round of dramatic cuts to the defense budget forcing the Pentagon to institute major force reductions and benefit cutbacks

With all of these major challenges arising at once, it's imperative that we let our legislators know how we feel about them. As you are aware, during the month of August, most elected officials will be back home in their districts meeting with constituents. This is a great opportunity for you to visit your legislators' local offices and advise them of your and MOAA's concerns on these matters. To assist you in preparing for these meetings, we've developed all the tools you'll need for success. A key point is that these aren't just "defending our rice bowl" issues; they're critical matters for sustaining retention and readiness – the core of our national defense – over the long term. To assist you in preparing for these meetings, we've developed fact sheets and talking points on the two key issues listed above. We don't have to be experts on every issue. But National MOAA has designed some packages that include a "key points" summary to talk from, along with onepage fact sheets on each issue that can be printed and sent or delivered to the legislators and/or their staffs. You're probably aware that MOAA has been successful on Capitol Hill and one of the main reasons is that we have members who are willing to contact our legislators and express our views on issues that are important to us. And the grassroots support of MOAA members has never been as important as it is now.

First, the proposed FY2014 Defense Authorization Bill assumes that sequestration will be repealed, but if it isn't the Pentagon will be forced to resort to even more draconian measures. In July, Secretary Hagel released a statement that outlines the following harmful impacts if sequestration remains in effect:

- Acceleration of force draw downs
- Reductions in flying hours and training drills and 10% reductions in operations/maintenance accounts
- 15-20% cuts in modernization accounts
- Involuntary reductions-in-force to reduce civilian personnel costs & hiring freezes

Halting all accessions, promotions, permanent-change-of-station moves & discretionary bonuses

Cutting an additional \$52 billion from the defense budget for the next fiscal year would be a disaster as we continue to send our service men and women into harm's way in Afghanistan, and face potential new threats from other countries hostile to our national interests.

The MOAA Position: While debt reduction is a national priority, such a disproportional share of this burden must not be foisted on the backs of military families who already have sacrificed more for their country than any other segment of Americans. *Congress must put partisan politics aside and develop an alternative debt reduction package that more fairly balances required sacrifices and avoids disproportional penalties for service members and retirees and their families.*

Second, at issue: A military at war must be protected against pay raise cutbacks.

Background: Sustaining pay raises comparable to the average American's is a fundamental tenet of the All-Volunteer Force. Historical experience with capping military raises below private sector pay growth shows that, once pay raise caps start, they're continued until they undermine retention/readiness. When extended pay raise caps hurt retention in the 1970s, Congress had to enact two double-digit raises to correct. Congress has worked diligently for the last 12 years to fix the 13.5% pay gap (and the resulting retention problems) caused by repeatedly capping military raises below private sector pay growth in the 1980s and '90s. In 2003, Congress explicitly tied annual military raises to private sector pay growth, as measured by the Bureau of Labor Statistics' Employment Cost Index (ECI).



Now, the FY2014 Pentagon budget request and the Senate Armed Services Committee draft of the National

Defense Authorization Bill (NDAA) propose a 1% pay raise cap (vs. the 1.8% indicated by the ECI, and supported by the House NDAA). Because the President and Congress have acted to freeze federal civilian pay raises, some have opined "the military should share that sacrifice."

The MOAA Position: It would be singularly inappropriate to cap/freeze the military pay raise for troops and families at war. Compensation is pay divided by the level of effort required to earn it. If cash is increased 10% while required sacrifice is increased 50%, that's not a pay raise.US troops and families already are extremely overstressed from having to bear 100% of America's wartime sacrifice for the past 12 years —no civilian sacrifice comes close. The troops' last three raises averaged less than 1.6% — already the lowest in 50 years. History shows comparability can't work unless it's sustained through both good and bad budget times.

Recommendation: Sustain the statutory 1.8% military pay raise for FY2014 by rejecting the Senate Armed Services Committees provision (Sec. 601 of S. 1197) to cap pay at 1.0%.

Important Information Concerning School/Sports Physical, Immunizations

Children ages 4-18 needing school/sports physical, immunization and the Alabama blue cards, please make their appointment now. You will need to bring the following items to the appointment:

- All pertinent form(s) from your child's school. Please complete your portion of the form (s) in advance.
- Your child's shot records or copies of the latest blue card.

Once we receive all of the appropriate documents, we will have 72 hours to complete the blue card and return it to you. When the furlough starts, we will have fewer appointments to prepare for the start of school. Please contact us at 256-955-8888 to schedule an appointment.

Tetanus-Diphtheria-Acellular Pertussis (Tdap) Vaccine

All students 11 and older entering the sixth grade in Alabama schools must have a tetanus-Diphtheria-acellular pertussis (Tdap) vaccine. This is required because of the change from tetanus-diphtheria (Td) to (Tdap) vaccine. The Tdap vaccine will protect adolescents form pertussis and keep them from spreading the disease to siblings, other family members, and other students. In addition to receiving the shots on a walk-in basis from 0800-1530 Hours at Fox Army Health Center, you may obtain the shots at the Madison Health Department or from your private physician.
