# Legislative Corner Lt Col Charles Clements, USAF-Ret





"All politics is local."

The Alabama Legislature this year approved several bills related to the military, its members and their families. The bills signed into law this year were:

- House Bill 44 by Rep. Chris Blackshear, R-Phenix City, expands the Military Stability Commission to include representatives from Fort Moore, previously named Fort Benning. In Columbus, Georgia, Fort Moore provides 4,346 jobs in Alabama's Russell and Lee counties.
- Senate Bill 17 by Sen. Tom Butler, R-Madison, requires that all state references to the United States Armed Forces should include the United States Space Force.
- Senate Bill 37 by Senator Sam Givhan, R-Huntsville, extends professional license reciprocity to spouses of U.S. Department of Defense contractor spouses.
- Senate Bill 46 by Senator Arthur Orr, R-Decatur, creates an interstate teacher mobility compact that allows teachers licensed in compact member states to teach in Alabama as long as their license requirements meet or exceed Alabama's requirements.
- Senate Bill 67 by Sen. Clyde Chambliss, R-Prattville, provides flexibility for educational tuition reimbursement for active members of the Alabama National Guard.
- House Bill 246 by Rep. Kenneth Paschal, R-Pelham, creates a compact allowing cosmetologists who are licensed to practice in participating states to also practice within Alabama.
- House Bill 129, also by Paschal, outlines the proper and respectful final disposition of unclaimed cremated remains of military veterans in a state or national cemetery.
- House Bill 210 by Rep. Rhett Marques, R-Enterprise, allows active
  military members who have motor vehicles registered in Alabama but
  live in another state on military assignment to get their required vehicle
  liability insurance in the state where they are stationed.

The Military Stability Commission's mission is to protect and expand military installations in the state. A recent economic impact study found that the defense industry, including private aerospace companies and shipbuilders, accounted for an annual economic impact of \$50.3 billion in Alabama, providing 264,780 jobs with an annual payroll of \$19.3 billion.

The U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the map lawmakers approved in 2021 violated the Voting Rights Act of 1965. It was the latest development in a lawsuit that alleged Alabama's congressional maps were discriminatory, as just one of the

It seems there is a sale at the gun shop every two weeks. It's not advertised on the Exchange web site – but it does show up if you add the sale items to your chart at shopmyexchange.com. Not sure how long the sales will continue but good deals at 10% off if you use your STAR card. On sale now are back to school items, TV's. computers, Apple products, and everyday shop for your military pride items. You can also start your items to buy list now for the usual weeklong Black Friday sale with 10% off and an additional 10% off with your STAR card. Or, if you don't have a STAR card yet, you can get EVERYTHING you buy your first day's purchase for at least 10% off and sometimes 15% off.



# Fox Army Health Center MAJ Bruce T. Robinson, USA-Ret



- Fox has new clinic hours: 0730 1600.
- Fox will be closed on the afternoon of August 16 from 1200 1600 for training.
- DYK? Fox Optometry Clinic provides primary care vision services including comprehensive ocular health exams to all beneficiaries (Active Duty, Active Duty Family Members, Retirees and their family members. Call the main appointment line, 256-955-8888 option 2.
- We've been able to fill a vacant position in Behavioral Health so that we are now able to provide a service that has been missing for a while:
  - The Child Family Behavioral Health Therapist is able to see the family members of Active-Duty beneficiaries, starting at age 6. This included evidenced based counseling for adolescents and adults, play therapy for children, and parenting skills associated with therapeutic interventions with their children.
  - o In 2021, the Surgeon General issued an advisory on the mental health needs for our youth. Additionally, nationally, there has been a shortage of mental health providers particularly for our children. For Service Members and their families, it is important that they know their family members can receive the mental health care that they need, which contributes to the overall health of the family.
  - Treatment from Fox Army Health Child and Family Behavioral health, occurs within the Department of Behavioral health, located on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor of Fox, between the hours of 0730 and 1600. If family members are interested in receiving care, they are welcome to call DBH to schedule an intake for further screening of need and if CABHS is the right level of care for the need.
- Fox Army Health Center's Tobacco Cessation Program incorporates motivation, behavior modification, strategies for coping with cravings, peer support, and medication safety education into each session.
  - Free to all TRICARE beneficiaries and DoD civilians
  - Free tobacco cessation medication, if indicated
  - Pre-program screening and orientation visit
  - o Five classes held every Tuesday from 1130-1230
  - o Blood pressure evaluations at each session
  - o Interval telephone follow-up for one year

#### Surviving Spouse Corner: Finding Your Path After Losing Your Spouse

When you lose your spouse, you often face lifestyle questions that need to be answered. Do I stay in my home? Should I move closer to my children? Should I go back to work? Should I start volunteering?

Like others, when I lost my husband 20 years ago, I needed to address those questions.

My situation was different than some because my mother, who was 94 at the time, had been living with us for 13 years. She wasn't keen on moving, which meant we weren't going anywhere.

When she passed away four years later, I decided to get back to work. But my home wouldn't remain empty for long.

Soon after my mother's death, my older sister retired and wanted to move in with me. She relocated from California to my home in Virginia. She stayed two years and then moved to Colorado, where she had wanted both of us to move initially.

Was that the end of my roommate revolving door? Far from it: Next came my grandson and his best friend for what was supposed to be a six-month stay while one found a job and the other finished school. Instead, one stayed with me for two years and the other for six. I learned living with young boys was much different than raising my three daughters.

Next came my daughter and son-in-law, who wanted to relocate from the Washington, D.C., area after retiring. They have been here for going on five years.

Do I miss my privacy sometimes? Of course. I'm sure my housemates also miss theirs from time to time. But it's been a very good fit.

There are pros and cons to an open-door policy — what has worked for me and my family in recent decades might not be ideal for you. But I believe life has a way of leading us to where we're meant to be — and in this case, it's kept me in my home.

Evidently, that is what I always wanted.

# Matthew 6.11: Give us this day our daily bread.

#### Matthew 6.34:

So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today.

#### James 4.14:

Yet you do not even know what tomorrow will bring. What is your life? For you are a mist that appears for a little while and then vanishes.



This past month I have heard the word, tomorrow, in so many ways. Even though the word tomorrow means the next day, it can also signify sometime in the future. My daughter often tells me she will take care of it tomorrow. I often tell my wife the same thing, especially when I don't want to deal with the issue at hand.

I often hope tomorrow will be sunnier than today. I want to put off the harder things or those that are pure drudgery, thinking it will be easier tomorrow. Maybe I'll have a better night's sleep, or maybe the issue at hand will fix itself, so that I don't have to take care of it. No matter how you look at it though, we are putting off things that should be dealt with today.

Writer and Pastor John Ortberg said that the word "tomorrow" may be one of the most dangerous words in the English language. And as I ponder his thoughts, I tend to agree. In Matthew 11 and in the Lord's prayer, we say, give us our daily bread. We don't ask for bread for the future, but what we need today. When we put off things we need to do today until tomorrow or sometime in the future, we may find ourselves surprised, as we don't know what tomorrow brings.

I had a friend in Montgomery who knew he was dying from cancer. While he thought about tomorrow, it wasn't a worry, he was looking to see what he could do today, looking for ways to make life easier for his wife tomorrow. The day before he died, he made a decision to make something easier for his wife in the future, he changed the oil in his wife's car.

state's seven congressional districts is majority black, despite 27% of the state's population being black. The Governor called for a special session to run from 17 July through 21 July. The new congressional district map approved on 21 July by the Alabama Legislature makes changes to all seven districts and moves about a dozen counties to different districts.

Democratic lawmakers denounced the plan and said it would not fix the likely Voting Rights Act violation found by a three-judge federal court and affirmed by US Supreme Court. Republicans, who hold three-fourths of the seats in the Legislature, approved the map by a 24-6 vote in the Senate and 75-28 in the House. They praised the plan for its compactness and said it kept together communities of interest, which they said included Mobile and Baldwin counties on the coast, the Black Belt, and the Wiregrass.

Democrats said the plan failed to address the key finding by the court, the need to create a second majority Black district, or, as the court said, "something quite close to it."

District 7 remains the only majority Black district, with a Black voting age population of 51%. The Black voting age population in District 2 increased from 30% to 40%. Republicans said that would comply with the court guidance to create a second district where Black voters would have an opportunity to elect a candidate of their choice. Democrats disputed that and said they will rely on the federal court to reject the plan.

21 July was set by the three-judge district court for the Legislature to pass a new map. The court's deadline was based on guidance from state officials about when a map would have to be ready in time for next year's elections. The court said the Black voters and organizations who are plaintiffs in the litigation should file their objections to the new map by 28 July. The court has tentatively scheduled a hearing on challenges to the plan to begin on 14 August. A summary of some of the changes:

- District 1, in southwest Alabama, still includes all of Baldwin and Mobile counties. The district became wider and flatter, losing Washington and Monroe counties on its north side and gaining most of Covington County on its east side.
- District 2 still covers southeast Alabama but changed substantially. It added Lowndes, Macon, and Russell counties. It added northwest Montgomery County and now includes all of that county. It lost Autauga and Conecuh counties, most of Covington, and about half of Elmore.
- District 3 in east Alabama also changed substantially. It lost Macon, Russell and Coosa counties and gained Etowah.
- District 4 still spans the state from east to west in the northern half of the state. It lost Etowah County and added Blount County.
- District 5, which spans most of the border with Tennessee, gained Lawrence County and lost a portion of Lauderdale County.
- District 6 in central Alabama gained Coosa and Autauga counties and lost Blount County.
- District 7 in west Alabama added Washington, Monroe, and Conecuh counties on the south end and lost Lowndes County.

The June 2023 Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W), released July 12, was 299.394, 2.6% above the FY 2023 baseline of 291.901. The next CPI-W release is set for 10 Aug 2023. The CPI-W figures from the end of this fiscal year (July, August, and September 2023) will be compared to the FY 2023 COLA baseline to calculate the 2024 COLA.

After graduating from Athens State Dale worked for First Alabama Bank and then as a Pharmaceutical Sales Representative. A lifelong volunteer fireman Dale continued to work as a first responder and as a 911 Dispatcher as well as with Huntsville Emergency Medical Services (HEMSI) and Huntsville Med-Flight. Dale continues to serve as an active member of the Monrovia Volunteer Fire Department as a firefighter and EMT answering hundreds of emergency calls a year.

Dale's commitment to saving lives was recognized when he was awarded the Medal of Valor for his service during the devastating tornado on Airport Road in Huntsville in November of 1989.

Dale and Laura have two children, Whitney who attends Auburn University, and Harrison who is a student at Westminister Christian Academy. Dale's children are being raised in the Mt. In November 2022, Dale was elected to serve as the next congressman for Alabama's Fifth Congressional District.
