### Legislative Corner Lt Col Charles Clements, USAF-Ret

"All politics is local."

On Tuesday, January 11, the Alabama Legislature began the 2022 Legislative Session. While the cloud of the COVID-19 pandemic remains, the Alabama Statehouse was open for business. The January start marks the fourth year of the quadrennium, meaning it is an election year, and every member's seat is up for election.

There were over 100 bills filed prior to the session, and many more since the session opened, bringing the first week total to 100 bills filed in the Senate and 149 bills filed in the House of Representatives. Some of the legislation filed so far deals with voting and elections, guns, lotteries, campaign finance, vaccines and student athletes. There are also proposed changes to certain custody, family leave, child support and alimony laws.

Governor Ivey gave her State of the State address setting out her priorities for the state and the session. She urged lawmakers to use federal pandemic relief on longstanding problems such as broadband access and water and sewer infrastructure. "We must be smart with this one-time money and commit to the people of Alabama that we will invest — not just casually spend — these dollars. I'll say again that these federal dollars are just one-time funds. This is not free money," Ivey said. How to use the money will be one the major issues before lawmakers in this session. Ivey also called for 4% pay raises for teachers and state employees.

Governor Ivey called the session on 18 January, putting on hold lawmakers' regular law-making session to focus on the spending of the \$772 million in American Rescue Plan Act funds. Senate Bill 1 prioritizes spending for broadband internet, assisting hospitals and nursing homes and building out water and sewer infrastructure in communities where service lacks.

Under Alabama law, there is no exclusion from the calculation of Alabama taxable income for these one-time pandemic-related federal benefits. "If the Legislature does not take quick action, Alabama families will pay about \$87.7 million in additional Alabama state income tax on these benefits," Sen. Dan Roberts, R-Mountain Brook, said Wednesday when he filed Senate Bill 2.

## Surviving Spouse Corner: Reflecting on 2021

The Surviving Spouse Advisory Council (SSAC) began 2021 once again dealing with the fallout of the pandemic. Yet, we continued to support surviving spouses and spouses in a positive way and promote MOAA's strategic priorities at every opportunity through education, encouragement, and engagement. We are proud of what we were able to accomplish during a most unsettling time.

Some of our accomplishments for 2021 include:

**Surviving Spouse Liaison Training.** SSAC members led surviving spouse liaison trainings during virtual meetings of four Regional Leadership Workshops and one in-person workshop. Average attendance for each workshop was 120, with 20 attending the surviving spouse liaison training. The year's final workshop was held in person in San Diego, where about 125 council and chapter leaders registered and 26 participated in our training. SSAC members continue to finetune the training based on evaluations and comments from participants.

**Surviving Spouse Virtual Chapter.** Membership continues to grow, with 177 members from 35 states. The chapter now meets monthly, on the third Tuesday of each month. Every other month is a business meeting with a speaker and the other months are an informal social gathering to exchange information and ideas. Attendance varies, but usually includes 30 at the social meetings and about 60 at a more formal meeting. Former SSAC member Micki Costello is president with Gail Joyce as vice president of the virtual chapter. For more information, visit the Surviving Spouse section of MOAA.org.

### **Spiritual Disciplines**

Chile is one of the astronomy capitals of the world, boasting three big-time observatories, including the Cerro Tololo observatory with its five telescopes.

Chile is the mecca of astronomers for several reasons. The sky is clear 85 percent of the time. The Cerro Tololo observatory is built 7,200 feet above sea level in the Andean foothills, where there is less air to distort a telescope's view. The region has a natural inversion layer that keeps the air at high altitude stable and the view better. Northern Chile is also directly under the Milky Way, so astronomers can peer into our galaxy for up to eight hours a night, in contrast to five hours at observatories in Hawaii which is the astronomy capital of the northern hemisphere.

Certain places on earth offer a clearer view of the heavens, and certain disciplines offer a clearer view of the heavens, and certain spiritual disciplines offer a clearer view of the spiritual things. Throughout the history of the church, believers have found that activities such as Bible memorization and meditation, fasting and prayer, solitude and study, celebration and worship, guidance and confession have helped them better see God and His truth.

The Supreme Court has stopped a major push by the Biden administration to boost the nation's COVID-19 vaccination rate, a requirement that employees at large businesses get a vaccine or test regularly and wear a mask on the job. At the same time, the court is allowing the administration to proceed with a vaccine mandate for most health care workers in the U.S. The court's conservative majority concluded the administration overstepped its authority by seeking to impose the Occupational Safety and Health Administration's vaccine-or-test rule on U.S. businesses with at least 100 employees.

President Joe Biden's effort to encourage the US Senate to alter its rules on ending or at least weakening the filibuster rule appears to have failed. The rule requires 60 votes to end debate on significant legislation. Senators Joe Manchin, D-W.Va., and Kyrsten Sinema, D-Ariz., have repeatedly said that while they back the voting rights push, they oppose weakening the filibuster rule without GOP support for fear of further fraying the brittle relationship between the two parties. They're the same two senators who've been the chief stumbling blocks to Biden's stalled 10-year, roughly \$2 trillion social and environment bill, another top Democratic goal. This was the second time in the last few months that POTUS made a trip to Capitol Hill to push for legislation only to come up empty handed.

Inflation jumped at its fastest pace in nearly 40 years last month, a 7% spike from a year earlier that is increasing household expenses, eating into wage gains and heaping pressure on POTUS and the Federal Reserve to address what has become the biggest threat to the U.S. economy.

The December 2021 CPI is 273.925, 2.1 percent above the FY 2022 COLA baseline. The Consumer Price Index for January 2022 is scheduled to be released Feb. 10. The CPI baseline for FY 2022 is 268.421.

Please read the recent posting to the Legislative portion of our webpage. There are two articles to look at: one is about the big problem DoD has with late appropriations legislation and the other is the Federal court decision to block COVID-19 vaccine mandates relating to the Navy.

He was appointed to the position in December 2020.

His aerospace engineering career began as a propulsion engineer at Martin Marietta in Huntsville, supporting Marshall's Propulsion Systems Laboratory from 1988 to 1990.

A native of Athens, Alabama, Leopard graduated from the University of Alabama in Huntsville in 1987 with a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering.

Leopard has received numerous NASA awards, including the Medal for Outstanding Leadership in 2007 and 2011; the Medal for Exceptional Achievement in 1997 for leading the Integrated Propulsion Technology Demonstrator team; multiple Center Director's Commendations; and numerous group achievement and special service awards. In 1993, he was awarded the Silver Snoopy, the NASA astronaut corps' award to those who have made significant contributions to the success of NASA's human spaceflight missions.

Leopard and his wife Shane live in Athens and have two children.

Mel graduated from Union Hill High School in 1950 after leading their basketball team to a 39-1 record and a State Championship. His ability to "Shine" on the court earned him the nickname that stayed with him throughout his life. He attended the University of Alabama where he played basketball and ran track for the Tide. ## History of Valentine's Day

Valentine's Day occurs every February 14. Across the United States and in other places around the world, candy, flowers and gifts are exchanged between loved ones, all in the name of St. Valentine. But who is this mysterious saint and where did these traditions come from? Find out about the history of Valentine's Day, from the ancient Roman ritual of Lupercalia that welcomed spring to the card-giving customs of Victorian England.

#### The Legend of St. Valentine

The history of Valentine's Day—and the story of its patron saint—is shrouded in mystery. We do know that February has long been celebrated as a month of romance, and that St. Valentine's Day, as we know it today, contains vestiges of both Christian and ancient Roman tradition. But who was Saint Valentine, and how did he become associated with this ancient rite?

The <u>Catholic Church</u> recognizes at least three different saints named Valentine or Valentinus, all of whom were martyred. One legend contends that Valentine was a priest who served during the third century in Rome. When Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made better soldiers than those with wives and families, he outlawed marriage for young men. Valentine, realizing the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret. When Valentine's actions were discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death. Still others insist that it was Saint Valentine of Terni, a bishop, who was the true namesake of the holiday. He, too, was beheaded by Claudius II outside Rome.

Other stories suggest that Valentine may have been killed for attempting to help Christians escape harsh Roman prisons, where they were often beaten and tortured. According to one legend, an imprisoned Valentine actually sent the first "valentine" greeting himself after he fell in love with a young girl—possibly his jailor's daughter—who visited him during his confinement. Before his death, it is alleged that he wrote her a letter signed "From your Valentine," an expression that is still in use today. Although the truth behind the Valentine legends is murky, the stories all emphasize his appeal as a sympathetic, heroic and—most importantly—romantic figure. By the <u>Middle Ages</u>, perhaps thanks to this reputation, Valentine would become one of the most popular saints in England and France.

### Origins of Valentine's Day: A Pagan Festival in February

While some believe that Valentine's Day is celebrated in the middle of February to commemorate the anniversary of Valentine's death or burial—which probably occurred around A.D. 270—others claim that the Christian church may have decided to place St. Valentine's feast day in the middle of February in an effort to "Christianize" the pagan celebration of <u>Lupercalia</u>. Celebrated at the ides of February, or February 15, Lupercalia was a fertility festival dedicated to Faunus, the Roman god of agriculture, as well as to the Roman founders Romulus and Remus.

To begin the festival, members of the Luperci, an order of Roman priests, would gather at a sacred cave where the infants Romulus and Remus, the founders of Rome, were believed to have been cared for by a she-wolf or lupa. The priests would sacrifice a goat, for fertility, and a dog, for purification. They would then strip the goat's hide into strips, dip them into the sacrificial blood and take to the streets, gently slapping both women and crop fields with the goat hide. Far from being fearful, Roman women welcomed the touch of the hides because it was believed to make them more fertile in the coming year. Later in the day, according to legend, all the young women in the city would place their names in a big urn. The city's bachelors would each choose a name and become paired for the year with his chosen woman. These matches often ended in marriage.

### Valentine's Day: A Day of Romance

Lupercalia survived the initial rise of <u>Christianity</u> but was outlawed—as it was deemed "un-Christian"—at the end of the 5th century, when Pope Gelasius declared February 14 St. Valentine's Day. It was not until much later, however, that the day became definitively associated with love. During the Middle Ages, it was commonly believed in France and England that February 14 was the beginning of birds' mating season, which added to the idea that the middle of Valentine's Day should be a day for romance. The English poet <u>Geoffrey Chaucer</u> was the first to record St. Valentine's Day as a day of romantic celebration in his 1375 poem "Parliament of Foules," writing, "For this was sent on Seynt Valentyne's day / Whan every foul cometh ther to choose his mate."

Valentine greetings were popular as far back as the Middle Ages, though written Valentine's didn't begin to appear until after 1400. The oldest known valentine still in existence today was a poem written in 1415 by Charles, Duke of Orleans, to his wife while he was imprisoned in the <u>Tower of London</u> following his capture at the <u>Battle of Agincourt</u>. (The greeting is now part of the manuscript collection of the British Library in London, England.) Several years later, it is believed that King <u>Henry V</u> hired a writer named John Lydgate to compose a valentine note to Catherine of Valois.

### Who Is Cupid?

<u>Cupid</u> is often portrayed on Valentine's Day cards as a naked cherub launching arrows of love at unsuspecting lovers. But the Roman God Cupid has his roots in Greek mythology as the <u>Greek</u> god of love, Eros. Accounts of his birth vary; some say he is the son of Nyx and Erebus; others, of Aphrodite and Ares; still others suggest he is the son of Iris and Zephyrus or even Aphrodite and Zeus (who would have been both his father and grandfather).

According to the Greek Archaic poets, Eros was a handsome immortal played with the emotions of Gods and men, using golden arrows to incite love and leaden ones to sow aversion. It wasn't until the Hellenistic period that he began to be portrayed as the mischievous, chubby child he'd become on Valentine's Day cards.

### Typical Valentine's Day Greetings

In addition to the United States, Valentine's Day is celebrated in Canada, <u>Mexico</u>, the United Kingdom, France and Australia. In Great Britain, Valentine's Day began to be popularly celebrated around the 17th century.

By the middle of the 18th, it was common for friends and lovers of all social classes to exchange small tokens of affection or handwritten notes, and by 1900 printed cards began to replace written letters due to improvements in printing technology. Ready-made cards were an easy way for people to express their emotions in a time when direct expression of one's feelings was discouraged. Cheaper postage rates also contributed to an increase in the popularity of sending Valentine's Day greetings.

Americans probably began exchanging hand-made valentines in the early 1700s. In the 1840s, Esther A. Howland began selling the first mass-produced valentines in America. Howland, known as the "Mother of the Valentine," made elaborate creations with real lace, ribbons and colorful pictures known as "scrap." Today, according to the Greeting Card Association, an estimated 145 million Valentine's Day cards are sent each year, making Valentine's Day the second largest card-sending holiday of the year (more cards are sent at <u>Christmas</u>).
