"All politics is local."

Please make an effort to exercise your right to VOTE!!

The Mid-Term election is 8 November 2022. One US Senate seat is on the ballot. All 7 of the US House of Representatives seats are on the ballot, but you vote for the candidate associated with the district you reside in—for most of us it will be District 5. All 35 State Senate seats and all 105 State House seats are on the ballot, but again you vote for the person of your choice based on where you live. All of us make a choice for Governor, lieutenant governor and the other statewide offices. Also, there is the matter adopting a new Alabama Constitution and there are serval amendments on the ballot.

Tax revenues into the Alabama Education Trust Fund were a record \$10.4 billion in the fiscal year 2022. That was 20.54% above fiscal 2021. The state's General Fund ended 2022 8.4% over 2021. "These are unprecedented times," Rep. Danny Garrett, the chair of the House education budget committee, said Monday about the revenue gains that were heavily impacted by federal COVID-19 relief money. Garrett, R-Trussville, and the other legislative chairmen are now bracing for those COVID funds to run out and a downturn in the economy. An analysis by Moody's last month showed Alabama was one of 43 states that have the cash needed to weather an economic slump within the next two years without having to resort to severe spending cuts or tax increases.

The U.S. Supreme Court last month heard oral arguments on a lawsuit challenging Alabama's congressional redistricting map; a case that could have far-reaching implications for how state legislatures go about the process of redrawing lines every ten years. The lawsuit claims the Alabama congressional map dilutes the voting strength of Black residents by packing a large number of them into a single district—the 7th, where 55% of voters are Black—while fragmenting other communities. Alabama argued in court filings that the state's Black population is too spread out to be able to create a second majority district without abandoning core redistricting principles such as keeping districts compact and keeping communities of interest together. Alabama Attorney General Steve Marshall said the map is "based on race-neutral redistricting principles that were approved by a bipartisan group of legislators." "The Voting Rights Act does not force states to sort voters based on race," Marshall said in a statement. "The VRA is meant to prohibit racial gerrymanders, not require them."

Huntsville's budget for the 2023 fiscal year that began 1 October. The city's general fund budget has been set at \$281 million. 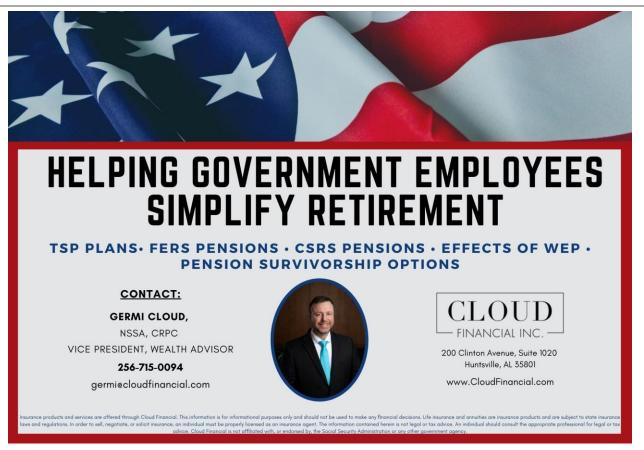

Update from Fox Army Health Center

Fox Army Health Center has transitioned to a new electronic health record (EHR), MHS Genesis, to help streamline and standardize patient record keeping. We "went live" on 24 September. As we acclimate to using the new EHR, patients will experience longer than normal wait times for appointments in clinical services and pharmacy. In an effort to minimize wait times, we encourage using one of these alternative options for receiving same day care:

- TRICARE Nurse Advice Line 24/7 access to a licensed nurse who can provide medical advice. Call 1-800-874-2273, Option 1, to speak with a nurse.

Surviving Spouse Corner: Strengthen the MOAA Community

While waiting in my little cabin in the remote Georgia mountains for a handyman, I decided to do an online search for a nearby MOAA chapter. I found one only 30 miles away, so I emailed my phone number to the chapter president and awaited a response.

The next day, he called and invited me to their chapter meetings, the state convention, and their Christmas dance. I responded with an invitation to my Florida chapter. We had such a lovely warm chat. It was almost like speaking to a member of my family.

I like to think of MOAA as a community, where joys, ambitions, sorrows, loyalties, and good works are shared. Connections of past service, local activities, charitable work, and legislative initiatives cement the bonds of friendship.

To strengthen our community, reach out. If you hang your hat at a second home, vacation someplace regularly, or spend more than a week with grown children or old friends in other locales, check to see if a MOAA chapter is nearby. By attending a meeting, you might gain new insights, learn their methods and successes, form bonds, and maybe reconnect with old friends. Observe the surviving spouses functioning in that chapter. Pick up pointers and share your chapter's successes.

To strengthen our community, reach younger. One summer, I took my grandson to a museum on an Air Force base. As we drove around, at each turn he exclaimed, "There's a grocery store, a church, a gas station, a bowling alley! This is just like a little town!" This was his first exposure to a military base. I had not realized what a great experience it would be for him. He was so impressed.

If you are near a base, check online for tours or museums open to youngsters. If that's not possible, look for books about the military at your library. (*Military Officer* magazine often suggests books to read and has reviews.) You can also watch movies with a military theme. Be sure and check for age appropriateness, though.

Another opportunity is having an overnight party with the grandkids. Bring out the photo albums and scrapbooks. Explain your spouse's role and assignments while in service. Relive some of your overseas adventures. The kids will love it. They'll learn a new dimension of your life and enjoy viewing photos from your youth.

Instill patriotism and love of country in the younger generation. Remind them of their responsibilities and your spouse's and family's history of service and sacrifice. Tell them of the activities of your MOAA chapter and your role in their good works as a member, surviving spouse liaison, board member, or active volunteer. You will be extending that sense of community to the next generation.

Demonstrate and teach them to "never stop serving."

traffic flow in and out of Redstone Arsenal. The seven projects:

- Highway 72 east from I-565 to Shields Road
- Widening Highway 53 in north Madison County from Tauras Drive to Old Railroad Bed Road
- Widening I-565 from County Line Road to Wall Tariana Highway
- Improvements at the I-565/Memorial Parkway interchange
- Widening Highway 72 west from Providence Main to County Line Road in both Huntsville and Madison
- Resolute Way interchange (just west of Research Park Boulevard) accessing the arsenal
- East Arsenal Connector from Sparkman Drive exit to Patton Road

In addition to plans for new roads to be built and the widening of other roads, the budget also includes a record \$19.15 million in road resurfacing, according to Shane Davis, the city's director of urban and economic development. Davis said that represents about a 30 percent increase in road resurfacing over last year's budget.

The 2023 COLA will be **8.7%**. The FY 2023 COLA baseline is **291.901**, compared with the FY 2022 baseline of 268.421, resulting in the above percentage increase. This baseline is determined by averaging the monthly Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) for the final three months of the fiscal year (July, August, September). The September 2022 CPI-W, released 13 October, is 291.854, which is also 8.7% above the FY 2022 COLA baseline. The CPI-W for October 2022, the first of the new fiscal year, is scheduled for release on 10 November 2022.

Nearly 200 veterans won major-party primaries this year and will vie for a seat in Congress in the midterm elections, making this the largest field of candidates with military experience in a decade. But experts warn that the larger pool will not necessarily lead to an increase in the number of veterans in office, since many of the hopefuls are in districts that significantly favor their opponents' party.

According to research by Veterans Campaign and Military Times, 184 House candidates with military experience won major party primaries earlier this year and will appear on state ballots in November. Another 12 candidates with military experience who won U.S. Senate primaries will also be listed. The 196 candidates represent an increase of about 7% from the 2020 election and the highest total since 2012.

<u>Tips for Reducing Your Tax Bill in Retirement</u>

After you stop working and are starting to withdraw money from your retirement savings, there are still steps you can take to help reduce your tax burden. And these steps can also have a ripple effect on other areas of your finances, such as your Medicare premiums and Social Security benefits.

Consider state taxes again. When you stop working, the state taxes on retirement pay may be more important to you, and the good news is that the situation has improved.

"What we've seen recently is a lot of states using their COVID-era surpluses to fully exempt military pensions from state individual income tax — states like Indiana, Missouri, Nebraska, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Utah," said Tim Vermeer, senior state tax policy analyst for the Tax Foundation.

To see how each state taxes military retirement pay, visit MOAA's Military State Report Card and Tax Guide. But consider other taxes that may also affect you. Alabama does not tax retirement pay.

"People are often attracted to Texas because it doesn't levy an individual income tax," said Vermeer. "However, many are surprised to find that their property tax bills are higher than they expected. This is a trade-off."

Carefully tap retirement savings. If you have several buckets of retirement savings — such as tax-free money from a Roth and taxable money from tax-deferred accounts — be careful when choosing which account to tap, especially before you have to take required minimum distributions starting at age 72. This may be a good time to consult a tax professional when plotting your withdrawal strategy, said Lila Quintiliani, AFC®, ChFC®, program director, financial and benefits education for MOAA.

Balancing withdrawals from tax-deferred accounts and the tax-free Roth may keep you in a lower income tax bracket and could reduce your Medicare premiums. Most people pay \$170.10 per month for Medicare Part B in 2022, but people whose modified adjusted gross income is more than \$91,000 if single or \$182,000 if married filing jointly pay from \$238.10 to \$578.30 per month in 2022 depending on their income (visit www.medicare.gov). Withdrawals from tax-deferred accounts, such as the traditional TSP or IRA, count in the calculation for the Medicare high-income surcharge, but tax-free Roth withdrawals do not.

Reduce RMDs with charitable distributions. One strategy to help reduce your taxable income after you start RMDs is to make tax-free qualified charitable distributions (QCDs). You can give up to \$100,000 from an IRA each year to charity, which counts toward your RMD but isn't taxable. You must transfer money directly from the IRA to the charity (ask your IRA custodian for their procedure; the money can't go to a donor-advised fund or private foundation).

Even though RMDs start at age 72, you can do QCDs after you turn 70½. You'll get a tax benefit from your charitable gift, regardless of whether you itemize or not. The money stays out of your adjusted gross income, so it isn't included in the income calculation for taxing Social Security benefits or the Medicare high-income surcharge. "QCDs can be really valuable because the distribution never shows up [in] your AGI," said Col. Curt Sheldon, USAF (Ret), a CFP® professional and enrolled agent in Alexandria, VA., and Life Member of MOAA.


