It's going to be a wild primary election season in southern Alabama, from Montgomery to the southern corners of the state. Twenty-one candidates--eight Republicans and 13 Democrats have qualified to run for the newly redrawn and open Congressional District 2. They include sitting Alabama House members from around the state and as far north as Huntsville, a current and former state senator, and a former NFL defensive end.

The Alabama-2 Republican candidates are:

- Sen. Greg Albritton is an attorney in his third term in the Senate. He's chairman of the Senate General Fund committee. He currently has his primary residence just outside the district in Atmore, but also has a home in Conecuh County, within the district.
- **Dick Brewbaker** served two terms in the Alabama Senate until 2018 and recently sold his family's auto dealership in Montgomery. Early in his career, Brewbaker was an educator.
- **Caroleene Dobson** is a Montgomery resident and attorney practicing real estate law with the Maynard Nexsen law firm in Birmingham.
- **Karla DuPriest** is a caterer and small business owner from Mobile. She ran for the U.S. Senate in 2022.
- **Wallace Gilberry** is a Bay Minette native who spent nine seasons in the NFL as a tight end.
- Hampton S. Harris is a real estate agent from Pike Road in Montgomery County.
- **Belinda Thomas** is the co-director of the ALGOP Outreach Coalition and a member of the Newton City Council in Dale County.
- Stacey T. Shepperson.

The Alabama-2 Democratic candidates are:

- James Averhard served in the United States Marine Corps for 30 years until 2017. In 2020, Averhard won the Democratic primary election in the race for Alabama's First Congressional District but lost in the general election to now-incumbent Congressman Jerry Carl, a Republican.
- Napoleon Bracy Jr. is a former Prichard City Council member and current Alabama House representative for District 98, which includes Saraland, a seat he's held since 2010. Bracy Jr. has worked for Austal USA.

Main Exchange

So far exchange and commissary have not stated all holiday hours, expect the Exchange to be as prior years: Regular hours except closing early Christmas eve and closed 25 December.

Computers, TV's, laptops, tablets and I-pad's – be sure to ask about layaway without charge.

Remember the self-check-out lanes only take credit/debit and STAR cards. No cash back or tobacco sales and if it's a clearance item you usually have to take it to a regular register or customer service to get the correct price.

You always get 10% off (sometimes more during special promotions) your first day's purchases when you use your STAR card. Something to keep in mind for Spring and the eventual winter clearance items. Use your STAR card at the food court for 10% off your purchases and 10% off catering orders.

Shopette

Hours: Christmas Day closed. All other days expect regular hours 0600-2200.

New wines and beers – stop in to check out the selection. Gluhwein and a wide variety of holiday gift sets now available. Visit the Redstone Express for Holiday Party and Tailgating supplies. Various wine selections are on sale each month so stop in and see what varieties are on sale this month. Depending on selection and off the regular price, the Express usually offers 10% on a case wine (but not liquor) – be sure to ask!

Various specials around the store including gift sets for various liquors. Plus, many local and craft beers.

Always save 5 cents per gallon (usually more during holidays) at the gas pumps when you use your STAR card.

Commissary

Expect Christmas: Close early 24 December at 1600. Closed Monday 25 December, reopen Tuesday 26 December regular hours. Commissary now open Monday's same hours as Sunday 0900-1800. Tuesday – Saturday 0900-1900.

New Year's: Closed early 31 December at 1700. Closed Monday 1 January 2024, reopen Tuesday 2 January 2024 regular hours.

TRICARE Open Season

TRICARE Open Season is the annual period when you can enroll in or change your health care coverage for the next year. Enrollment changes made during TRICARE Open Season will go into effect on the following January 1.

Mark Your Calendars

TRICARE Open Season is Nov. 13 through Dec. 12, 2023. FEDVIP Open Season is Nov. 13 through Dec. 11, 2023.

Am I Eligible to Participate in TRICARE Open Season?

You're eligible to participate if you're currently enrolled in, or eligible for a TRICARE Prime option, including USFHP, or TRICARE Select.

Open season doesn't apply to active -duty service members. It doesn't apply to <u>TRICARE for Life</u>—coverage is automatic if you have Medicare Part A and Part B. Open season also doesn't apply to premium-based plans.

If You're Eligible to Participate in TRICARE Open Season, You Have Three Options:

- Stay in your plan. If you want to stay in your current TRICARE health plan, you don't have to re-enroll. You'll continue in your current health plan as long as you're eligible.
- Enroll in a plan. If you're eligible for a TRICARE Prime option or TRICARE Select but not enrolled, you can <u>enroll in a plan</u> during TRICARE Open Season.
- Change plans. If you're already enrolled in a TRICARE Prime option or TRICARE Select, you can switch plans and switch between individual and family enrollment.

How Can I Enroll in a Health Plan?

You can enroll by:

- Enrolling online on milConnect
- Calling your regional contractor or designated provider:
- Submitting an enrollment form by mail or fax

Federal Benefits Open Season

TRICARE beneficiaries may also be eligible for the Federal Employees Dental and Vision Insurance Program (FEDVIP), managed by the Office of Personnel Management (OPM). Your eligibility depends on your beneficiary status. You'll need to have coverage in a TRICARE health plan to be eligible for vision coverage. Visit <u>BENEFEDS.com</u> to check eligibility, compare FEDVIP plans and rates, enroll in a plan, and more.

Making Enrollment Changes Outside of Open Season

Outside of TRICARE Open Season, you can enroll in or change enrollment to a TRICARE Prime option or TRICARE Select following a <u>Qualifying Life Event</u> (QLE). A QLE is a certain change in your life, such as marriage, birth of a child, or retirement from active duty, which may mean different TRICARE health plans are available to you and your family members.

Outside of the Federal Benefits Open Season, you can only enroll in FEDVIP or make changes to your existing FEDVIP plan if you experience a FEDVIP QLE. Remember, FEDVIP QLEs may be different from the TRICARE QLEs. To learn more, visit <u>BENEFEDS.com</u>.

Kansas Chapter Member Honored for Guiding Surviving Spouses

Lt. Col. Roy Yenchesky, USA (Ret), has been married for 47 years, yet offered to serve as surviving spouse liaison — a position often held by a widow or widower — when the Wichita (Kan.) Chapter of MOAA needed him nearly five years ago.

"I had been a financial advisor for eight years and helped several of my clients through the death of a loved one," he said. When the longtime chapter surviving spouse liaison moved and after many months of not being able to find a replacement, Yenchesky spoke up and said, "I can do that."

A Life Member of MOAA, he is driven to help by "the knowledge that our surviving spouses may need guidance through the maze of benefits they are entitled to. ... It is a very complex journey, and even after five years, I am still learning."

Using checklists, he approaches survivors in a low-key manner and takes them through what needs to be done. "Everyone deals with grief differently," he said.

For his dedication in assisting surviving spouses in small and large ways, Yenchesky has been named chapter-level recipient of MOAA's 2023 Surviving Spouse Liaison Excellence Award.

Appreciation for him comes from both MOAA leaders and spouses, such as Sue Tanner, The Retired Officers Wives Club president and MOAA member, who benefited from his help after her husband died.

"It seems that Roy is always searching for more ways to simplify things for spouses as they are trying to navigate the military system alone once they have lost their spouse," Tanner said. "He has made things so much easier for not only me but also many of the other spouses."

Lt. Col. Michael R. George, USAF (Ret), president of the Wichita Chapter, agreed.

"Roy contacts surviving spouses and families of deceased members and assists them in contacting the applicable support agencies so that benefits are not interrupted or missed. ... When engaging members in conversation, his emphasis is that *now* is the time to take care of personal affairs. He beseeches members not to wait until there is a death to address these critical issues."

- **Merika Coleman** is a lawyer by trade and a member of the Alabama Senate representing District 19 in Jefferson County. She previously served in the Alabama House.
- Anthony Daniels is a former teacher, current member of the Alabama House representing District 53, and has served as the House minority leader since 2017. Daniels has a dental practice in Huntsville.
- Shomari Figures is the son of Alabama Sen. Vivian Figures of Mobile and was an aide to President Barack Obama. Figures was also the former deputy chief of staff to Attorney General Merrick Garland.
- **Brian Gary** is a surgeon at Jackson Hospital in Montgomery, and a graduate of Tuskegee University.
- **Juandalynn Givan** is a lawyer in her professional life and a member of the Alabama House representing District 60 in Birmingham, a seat she's held since 2010.
- Jeremy Gray is a small business owner and member of the Alabama House representing District 83, which includes Opelika. Gray has been the Democratic minority whip in the House since 2019.
- **Phyllis Harvey-Hall** is a graduate of Alabama State and Troy universities, and the president of several educational organizations, including Educational Services Inc. and Teaching Transformations, LLC.
- **Vimal Patel** is a graduate of Auburn University, a realtor in Enterprise, and is a resident in Dothan. In 2022, Patel ran for Alabama Second Congressional District, but lost in the Democratic primary election to Phyllis Harvey-Hall.
- **Darryl Sinkfield** is the assistant executive director for field services with the Alabama Education Association.
- Larry Darnell Simpson.
- Willie Lenard.

The District 2 seat has drawn a crowded field that includes several members who live outside it, but that's allowed under federal law. And the fact that several of the candidates live outside the boundaries might lessen it as an attack tactic in campaigns.

U.S. Senator Tommy Tuberville said he's open to negotiating an end to his blockade of almost 400 military nominees after meeting with fellow Republican senators, signaling a shift after he has dug in on his protest of a Pentagon abortion policy for more than nine months.

The Senate has traditionally approved large groups of military nominations by voice vote, but just one senator's objection can upend that process.

Tuberville said he would work with other senators on possible options, and "hopefully we can start moving forward." That was a contrast to last week, when he said there was "zero chance" he would lift the holds, absent a change in policy.

The October 2023 Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W), released 14 November, was 302.071, 0.3% above the FY 2024 baseline of 301.236. The next CPI-W release is set for 12 December.

Yenchesky served in the Army for 26 years and commanded units in Korea, Germany, and the U.S. He did a combat tour in Vietnam and trained future officers at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., and in ROTC assignments. He started Junior ROTC in Wichita, now available in eight area high schools and 11 middle schools. He is treasurer and membership chair for the Badger State All Airborne Chapter of the 82nd Airborne Association and a member of the 173rd Airborne Association, AMVETS, and the American Legion.

Yenchesky centers his weekday schedule around babysitting his granddaughters, ages 6 and 3. "We play outside, build stuff with blocks, paint, color, do crafts, play family ... and do a lot of reading."

His advice for his granddaughters? Exactly what he practices as a MOAA volunteer: "Be kind."

Army-Navy Game

The **Army–Navy Game** is an American college football rivalry game between the Army Black Knights of the United States Military Academy (USMA) at West Point, New York, and the Navy Midshipmen of the United CStates Naval Academy (USNA) at Annapolis, Maryland. The Black Knights, or Cadets, and Midshipmen each represent their service's oldest officer commissioning sources. As such, the game has come to embody the spirit of the interservice rivalry of the United States Armed Forces. The game marks the end of the college football regular season and the third and final game of the season's Commander-in-Chief's Trophy series, which also includes the Air Force Falcons of the United States Air Force Academy (USAFA) near Colorado Springs, Colorado.

The first game between Army and Navy was on November 29, 1890. Since 1890, the two academies have played annually with the exception of five years and have played in consecutive annual games every season since 1930. Throughout its history, the game has been played in several neutral locations, including New York City and Baltimore, but it is most commonly played in Philadelphia, which is roughly equidistant from the two academies. Historically played on the Saturday after Thanksgiving (a date on which most other major college football teams end their regular seasons), the game is now played on the second Saturday in December and is traditionally the last regular-season game played in NCAA Division I football.

The Army–Navy game is one of the most traditional and enduring rivalries in college football. It has been frequently attended by sitting U.S. presidents. The game has been nationally televised each year since 1945 on either ABC, CBS, or NBC. CBS has televised the game since 1996 and has the rights to the broadcast through 2028. With the exception of 2022, ESPN's College GameDay has been televised from the game site on a yearly basis since 2014. Instant replay made its American debut in the 1963 Army–Navy game. Since 2009, the game has been held on the second Saturday of December and following FBS conference championship weekend.

The game is primarily played in Philadelphia, but the game has also been held in multiple locations including Chicago in 1926 and Pasadena, California in 1983. After Philadelphia, the New York area and the Baltimore–Washington area have most frequently hosted the game.

The series has been uninterrupted since 1930. Through the 2022 meeting, Navy leads the series 62–54–7.
